6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

The institution's vision is to achieve excellence and attain noble character through education. The mission statements of the institution are:

- > To encourage curiosity, innovative approach and scientific temperament.
- > To incorporate high-tech techniques to enhance the skills of the students.
- > To stimulate academic activity with integrated personality development.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Dedicated admission software is used by the college to manage/regulate the admissions and other records of students. The examination and results of students are managed through the online software

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The BOS, the statutory body is responsible for development of curriculum for Undergraduate courses.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

ICT facility has been integrated with formal, lecture based teaching. Students are encouraged to make PPT presentations as a part of their assignments and use online educational resources to enhance the quality of teaching-learning.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The evaluation methodology is formulated by the affiliating University itself. The college evaluates the students by conducting house tests, class tests and oral tests. The examination process and Internal Assessment system is totally transparent and impartial. The results are displayed on the notice board for a stipulated period for students to raise doubts, if any.

6.3.4 Research and Development

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- An e-corner has been introduced in the library for accessing online resources through the INFLIBNET and other forums.
- > A Language-cum-Career Lab has been instituted in the College
- > Tally ERP 9.0 software has been installed in the college for use by Commerce students
- > Latest laboratory equipment has been added to the Science labs
- > Digital lecterns have been provided to augment the ICT infrastructure

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

All staff members are governed by the service rules of the govt. of HP. Salaries and remuneration, leave, medical and other welfare schemes are implemented for them as per the government norms. The college has adopted a student charter which defines the duties and responsibilities of the institution towards its students as well as the duties and responsibilities of the students.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- The teaching faculty is recruited by the HPPSC and appointed by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Himachal Pradesh.
- Temporary faculty and support staff is also locally recruited as per requirement through the agency of the PTA.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

No Industrial Interaction has been done.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The admission is done primarily on the merit-basis. The minimum eligibility criterion followed is 33% in B.A. and 45% in B.Sc. and B.Com. Admission process is completely transparent and it is systematically administered on roll-on basis.

It takes into account the applicable norms and policies of reservation standards for students of weaker sections. There is provision of 15% reservation for SC and 7.5% for ST students. A relaxation of 5% in the minimum cut off percentage is available to SC/ST/Disabled candidates and up to three years relaxation in age in admission to the SC/ST candidates. The Institution ensures due representation from both genders and weaker sections like IRDP and takes steps to encourage the gender equity as it is co-educational institute. There is an exemption of the tuition fee from the students having more than 40% disability and the girl students.

The affiliating university has introduced reforms in the examination in accordance with the newly introduced UGC-CBCS system in which thirty per cent emphasis is placed on internal evaluation of students while seventy per cent marks are awarded on the basis of end-semester examination.
